CONSOLIDATION: Voters approved the consolidation of Macon and Bibb County governments beginning in 2014. The transition from two governments to the new consolidated one has not been without hitches, but the willingness of newly elected board members to work together has made it a smoother transition than anticipated. Residents have been updated regularly through the local media.

HEALTH CARE: Many middle Georgians are uninformed about many health problems. Coliseum Health Systems, Dr. Johnny Gayton, local optometrist, Melody Faircloth of the health supplement store Willow Tree and others appear on Mix in the Morning regularly with health tips in many fields.

ECONOMY AND JOBS: The unemployment rate in middle Georgia does fluctuate, depending on the season, but during most times of the year, it is as high or higher than the state average. Regular reports on the unemployment issue and public service announcements help to keep the public informed of the trends.

ROBINS AIR FORCE BASE: Robins Air Force Base is the largest single employer in middle Georgia, and is a vital player in the economy of the area. Constant confirmation of the community's support of the base help to keep the base open and flourishing. With periodical BRAC assessments, it's important that those in higher places know that the community appreciates the value of the base and supports it's efforts. Periodical releases from the office of information, 21st Century Partnerships and other base-related organizations and our own news department help this station keep the public updated

EDUCATION: This is not only a class-room issue, but one that encompasses education on issues that concern the community, information on programs that assist residents and progress made in consolidating educational institutions to reduce costs while adding availability.

ANIMAL CONTROL: Efforts continue to convince pet owners to have dogs and cats spayed or neutered to control the growing population. While this is next to impossible where animals are abandoned and left to roam freely, spaying and neutering will continue to downsize and control the pet population. Programs of free spaying and neutering is offered by several local businesses. The process for adopting pets is also covered.

CRIME: Overall, crime is a nationwide problem. Middle Georgia is no different. Almost daily there are reports of murders, armed robberies, assaults, car-jackings, or lesser crimes. These stories are reported by WPGA to help inform the public on where crimes are being committed, urging the public to be especially cautious if they must travel, or if they live, in these high crime area.

CONSOLIDATION

July 1, 2014. Ron Wildman reports today that budget battles were not to be unexpected for the new Macon-Bibb County budget, since members of the new commission had served previously as either a Macon council member, or a Bibb commissioner. However, on Monday, the consolidated body unanimously agreed to a budget that adds nearly \$700 thousand additional dollars to Mayor Robert Reichert's original spending plan. Commission member Mallory Jones was a no-show for the vote, and Gary Bechtel voted electronically from Germany.

July 8, 2014: The attorney in the appeal case involving a Planning and Zoning ruling concerning Zebulon Road property will have 14 days to file revised briefs, according to a story this morning reported on Mix in the Morning by Ron Wildman. Earlier this year, P&Z voted to rezone 25 acres of land from residential to commercial, something home owners in the area fought before Bibb Superior Court Judge Ed Ennis.

July 15, 2014: The Macon-Bibb Commission is expected to make the final vote on transferring the Terminal Station property to the Macon Transit Authority at tonight's meeting. Mayor Robert Reichert says the building would become eligible for extensive federal transportation grants in the transfer is approved.

August 7, 2014: Macon-Bibb mayor Robert Reichert made an appearance on Mix in the Morning today to update citizens on the state of the city and county during the first year of the consolidated government. Reichert appeared with hosts Aaron Bowers and Gail Daniels from 7:30 to 8:00, a total of thirty minutes on the air.

August 20, 2014: Ron Wildman says this morning that Mayor Robert Reichert and the Macon-Bibb Commission has set the millage rate for the consolidated government. The action came prior to the regular bi-monthly meeting. Despite several changes in computing the rate, it appears that former city homeowners will pay 19.5mils, about \$80 less per \$100

thousand, and county residents will pay about the same as last year, 14.652 mils.

August 26, 2014: A study will be made by the consolidated Macon-Bibb County government into the possibility of turning the Willie C. Hill Government Annex Building into loft apartments. The resolution was passed allowing the study by the economic and community development committee. A final binding vote would come at the next full commission meeting on September 2nd.

September 10, 2014: Special Purpose Local Option Sales Tax project manager Clay Murphy told mayor Robert Reichert and the full Macon-Bibb commission that the Second Street project, and others, are ahead of schedule. During his Mix in the Morning news segments today, Ron Wildman said Murphy appeared before mayor and commission during one of those five in the afternoon every-other-week work sessions. The \$8 million Second Street project has been under construction for four weeks.

HEALTH CARE

July 2, 2014: Macon's Medical Center and the Medical facility in Milledgeville will be joining forces to better serve the health care needs of middle Georgia. Oconee Regional in Milledgeville will now have access to the Medical Center of Central Georgia's vast array of services, and will bring those services to Baldwin and surrounding counties. The two hospitals have a so-called loose relationship in recent months, but indicate the latest move cements a closer tie-in.

Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00 and 8:30 for a total of four minutes

July 3, 2014: Former three-term Macon city council member Nancy White is the new administrator for the Macon-Bibb County Health Department. White has been the head of the Medical Center's Oncology Services Department for the past four years. Ron Wildman reports today on Mix in the Morning that, prior to her position at the Medical Center, White was employed for several years by Coliseum Medical Center. Both medical centers are centered in Macon but serve the entire middle Georgia area.

Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00 and 8:30 am for a total of five minutes.

July 8, 2014: The Medical Center of Central Georgia and Putnam General Hospital in Eatonton have joined in a business relationship. Officials at the Eatonton facility say this will allow them to expand services in the lake country area as well as adjoining counties. The story was released this morning by Ron Wildman on his Mix in the Morning newscasts.

July 11, 2014: A medical marijuana study committee will hold a public meeting in Macon in September. The body, created by the recent legislative session, includes Bibb County State Representative Allen Peake, who authored a bill to help a Monroe County girl with epilepsy. The Macon stopover on September 10th will be the study committee's fifth in a series. Peake's bill seeks to make the use of canibus, a marijuana derivative, legal as a cancer treatment. It's now legal in Colorado, and Peake's Journey of Hope Foundation helps defray expenses for local residents who must take a child to Colorado to get the necessary treatment.

August 1, 2014: All children attending the east Macon Neighborhood Academy will be tested for tuberculosis after it was discovered that a 9-month old boy at the facility has tested positive for TB. Another youngster has been tested, but results are not back from the lab. The Millerfield Road Child Day Care Center remains open.

August 14, 2014: Ron Wildman says today during his Mix in the Morning news presentation that one of the biggest charitable fundraisers of the year is taking place today at 22 middle Georgia Dairy Queen stores. It's 'Miracle reat Day' at the local DQs. Each blizzard sold today will mean a \$1 donation for the local Children's Hospital at the Medical Center. On this special day a year ago, the local Dairy Queens reported an average of a thousand blizzards, which meant a thousand dollars from each of the 22 stores was donated to the Children's Hospital. Officials are hoping for an even bigger public participation today.

August 13, 2014: The Mercer School of Medicine's seven million dollar renovation of the former Music Hall of Fame into a complete community medical complex is now complete. Ron Wildman reports today that some 35 family physicians and staffers will provide specialized out patient and primary care services to the mid state. Mercer president William Underwood conducted the ceremony.

September 11, 2014: Ron Wildman reports this morning that residents of the Peach County community of Byron met in the government building last night to continue taking steps toward the opening of a Byron-Peach County Charter School. Those in attendance heard from organizers who are mapping out the curriculum for the limited beginnings of the high school. Approved by the state, the effort has had to overcome a rejection vote by the local school board which has proved only a technicality since the county is under 1970s federal desegregation orders. The school will be housed in the old Byron High School building, which is being renovated and should be ready for use next year.

ECONOMY/JOBS

July 2, 2014: On today's Mix in the Morning news, Ron Wildman reports on a story that's encouraging to the local economy in the form of new jobs. Wildman says a 6-year postponement for construction of the Kumho Tire producing plant will be coming to an end. The delay, caused by the recession, allowed tire making equipment to advance to a level of Kumho being able to produce four million tires per year. The target start-up date is January 1, 2016 with 450 workers expected to be hired.

July 16, 2014: The Macon YKK Window producing plant will be doubled in size over the next few months, according to a story aired today by Ron Wildman on Mix in the Morning. The one-time zipper producing facility switched to windows and auxiliary items. The local plant has responded to the roller coaster economy with the expansion announcement.

July 25, 2014: The unemployment figures for the Macon area have moved above the 8% level again. The latest reports from the Georgia Department of Labor shows a jump from last May's 7.9 percent unemployment. By comparison, Athens had the state's lowest unemployment rate, 6.3%. Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00, 8:30 for a total of two minutes

July 29, 2014: Ron Wildman reports this morning that Georgia governor Nathan Deal was in Dublin yesterday to officially announce the location of a \$20 million manufacturing plant which will hire 150 workers to begin with. Valmeira Glass is headquartered in the former Soviet Block nation of Latvia. The 80,000 square foot factory will produce fiberglass parts for use in automobiles and in the oil industry. Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00, 9:30 for a total of three minutes

August 20, 2014: Governor Nathan Deal was in Warner Robins today to help that middle Georgia community begin a novel \$10 million Veterans Training Center. Groundbreaking on land donated by the City of Warner Robins brought together Central Georgia Technical College and the Macon-Warner Robins-Cochran Middle Georgia State in an effort to train veterans to fill spots in the job market. Classes should begin in about a year after construction begins this fall. Story aired on Mix in the Morning at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00 and 8:30 for a total of five minutes.

September 16, 2014: Goodwill Industries will be holding a job fair today beginning at 1:00pm, Ron Wildman reports on Mix in the Morning. The job fair will be held at the Anderson Conference Center off Eisenhower Parkway. Goodwill says 30 businesses and community based resource operations will be on hand to take applications. Among them will be the city of Warner Robins, Geico and the Marriott City Center Hotel. The job fair runs from 1 till 4pm today. Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00, 8:30 for a total of four minutes

EDUCATION:

July 2, 2014: Safety in our schools has become an ever-increasing concern, and U.S. Attorney Michael Moore wants to do something about it. Ron Wildman reports today that Moore, representing the middle Georgia area, is co-hosting a 'Safety in our schools' conference in Athens. Homeland Security director Charley English and Georgia Department of Education officials are joining Moore at the fifth annual 3-day event. The agenda calls for an in-depth report on various tragedies which have happened in America's schools in recent years, and how to prepare and react if such an event should happen at local schools.

Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00 and 8:30am for a total of six minutes.

July 8, 2014: The State of Georgia Teacher of the Year is from Houston County. Ron Wildman reports today that Amanda Miliner was honored by Warner Robins mayor and council at last night's regularly scheduled meeting. Mayor Randy Toms presented Miliner with a bouquet of flowers as the fourth grade math specialist received a standing ovation from council and the crowd that filled the council meeting room. Mrs. Miliner is a teacher at Miller Elementary School in Warner Robins.

Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00 and 8:30 for a total of four minutes

July 14, 2014: Calandra Wright of Fort Valley State University was a guest on Mix in the Morning in the school's once-a-week appearance to promote the various projects the school is involved in. Ms. Wright was on board to promote enrollment, and stressed that FVSU is now taking applications for the fall semester.

Ms. Wright was on the air from 8:30 to 9:00 am for a total of 30 minutes.

July 21, 2014: Dr. James Brown of Fort Valley State University appeared as a guest on Mix in the Morning from 8:30 to 9:00am. Dr. Brown discussed the upcoming Organic Fruits and Vegetables Pest and Weed Control Workshop to be held at the Pedigrew Center on the campus of Fort Valley State University. It's one of the non-classroom educational projects of FVSU.

Dr. Brown was on the air for a total of 30 minutes.

July 22, 2014: Ron Wildman reports today that Bibb coroner Leon Jones has praised youngsters at the Ebenezer Baptist Church who are involved in a summertime educational enrichment program. Jones, who makes

presentations to youngsters of all ages, told the pre-teens that he is proud of the extra efforts they are making to do well in the upcoming school year. Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00 and 8:30 for a total of three minutes

July 22, 2014: New teachers in the Bibb County school system will begin localized training this morning at Central High School. The new hires will spend the morning hours and lunchtime at Central. They will then move to their new school assignments this afternoon. The local school year opens on August 1st.

Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00 and 8:30 for a total of three minutes

July 23, 2014: Organizers of a project in Houston County to give away 2,000 book bags are asking for donations of school items to be placed in some of the bags. Many have been filled, but there is still a need for items students use on an everyday basis. Donations can be placed in containers at the Warner Robins and Perry Wal-Mart stores. The event will begin at 9:00am this Friday at McConnell-Talbert Stadium in Warner Robins.

July 25, 2014: On Mix in the Morning today, Ron Wildman says a large number of teachers and other workers in the Bibb County School System had a sample of potential menu items that will be served in the school's lunchrooms this school year. In an effort to battle obesity and diabetes, foods are being upgraded with more whole grains and less fat, sodium and sugar. The mid-day presentation, held at Howard High School, was a big hit with the hundreds who participated in the 'food show'.

September 4, 2014: Ron Wildman says today that Fort Valley State University has been facing severe drops in the number of students attending the predominantly black Peach County school. The dramatic drop is causing a seven million dollar budget shortfall. To begin addressing the budget crisis, officials are cutting 14 higher level administrative employees and taking other measures over the coming months to attract more students to the school. In 2011, there were nearly 4,000 students enrolled at the school, but only 2,400 have registered for the coming school year.

RAFB

July 7, 2014: On his Mix in the Morning newscasts this morning, Ron Wildman reports that Brig. Gen. Cedric George will be leaving his position as the Warner Robins Air Logistics Center commander. Gen. George will be assigned to an Air Force Headquarters position once his replacement at Robins arrives. The new commander will be Brig. Gen. Walter Lindsley. The Complex Commander's position was created when reorganization of the Air Materiel bases took place, downgrading Robins AFV in the system. RAFB is the biggest single employer in middle Georgia.

July 15, 2014: On his Mix in the Morning news today, Ron Wildman reports that the U.S. Air Force goal to cut nearly 35 hundred jobs will cost Robins Air Force Base about 258 positions. Wildman says the word comes from 21st Century Partnership, the leading RAFB supporter in middle Georgia. The losses are targeted at the Headquarters Air Force Reserve Command, Wildman says.

Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00 and 8:30 for a total of four minutes.

July 24, 2014: Ron Wildman reports on Mix in the Morning that Robins Air Force Base is entering the solar power age with a working agreement with the New Generation Power Company. The 20-year pact will allow creation of 10-megawatts of electric power on base property that is not in use by the military at the present time.

July 30, 2014: Ron Wildman reports today on Mix in the Morning that the date has been set for the next Warner Robins Air Logistics

Complex change of command ceremony. Brig. Gen. Walter Lindsley will officially take over the largest unit at Robins Air Force Base on August 11th. Outgoing chief Cedric George is the first outgoing commander for the "Complex" designation under a new alignment set up by the Air Force Command.

August 8, 2014: Ron Wildman reports today that former Macon mayor and U. S Congressman Jim Marshall told supporters of Robins Air Force Base to keep on doing their best, and continue to be innovative is Robins is to survive future Military cutbacks. Marshall is one of only ten people on a department of defense review board to study long term military plans.
Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00, 8:30 for a total of three minutes.

August 26, 2014: Robins Air Force Base welcomed back the former Air Logistics Center Commander, retired Gen. Ron Smith. Gen. Smith was on base to help re-open "Airman's Attic", a shop which is operated by the Robins Enlisted Spouses Club. It was started when Gen. Smith was head of the logistics center. 'Airman's Attic' contains donated items that military families can use free of charge.

September 12, 2014: The new president of the Robins Air Force Base support group 21st Century Partnership told the group that production needs to pick up in the F-15 repair division. Retired Lt. Gen. Charles Stenner says that is a primary area that needs upgrading. In his first quarterly meeting since being named to head up the 21st Century Partnership, Gen. Stenner said at present there are six F-15s being overhauled per month, when there needs to be eight overhauls per 30 days.

ANIMAL CONTROL;

July 10, 2014: Ron Wildman reports today on Mix in the Morning that the cat and kitten rescue operation 'Purrs N' Paws' is continuing to seek homes for more than 100 animals in its Rocky Creek Fall Line Plaza shopping center location. New Fall Line Plaza management gave the non-profit organization until October 15th to vacate the shopping center. Wildman says those who want more information can call Purrs 'N Paws at 478-508-7293.

August 1, 2014: Ron Wildman says today on Mix in the Morning that Mayor Robert Reichert is trying to work out an agreement with Central State Prison that would allow some inmates to participate in some of the activities at the new Animal Welfare Center. The two facilities are located near each other in western Bibb County, Reichert points out.

Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00, 8:30 for a total of three minutes

August 4, 2014: During his Mix in the Morning news segments today, Ron Wildman says that local pets got a refreshing dip in the east Macon community Center swimming pool Sunday. Traditionally, a day after the pool closes for the season, dogs and their masters show up for a dip. The pool's lifeguard staff stays close by to plunge into the pool if needed. There were no mishaps, and pets and owners went away refreshed and happy.

August 25, 2014: The Saturday 'Animal Forever After' rescue and adoption program had to pack up after about half their scheduled ten to three pm schedule. Even though there was plenty of water and shade, organizers decided it was simply too hot to keep the animals and good hearted people who were trying to find homes for the dogs that owners brought in for the day.

CRIME:

July 8, 2014: Ron Wildman reports this morning that the man who stole a Houston County Sheriff's patrol car is behind bars. Deputy Brett Sanders had pulled over 21-year old Seth Stewart and another man for speeding on I-

75. Drugs were found in their vehicle. After the deputy handcuffed both men and placed them in the back seat of his patrol car, apparently Stewart slipped through the opening between the front and rear seats, and drove off in the deputy's car. The vehicle was abandoned near the roadway about five miles away. Stewart was picked up a short time later and he, along with his accomplice Kimon Miller, were taken to jail. Both are from the Miami, Florida area Wildman reports.

Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00 and 8:30 for a total of five minutes

July 1, 2014. Ron Wildman reported today on his Mix in the Morning news that Warner Robins police have reported the solving of a nearly six-year old murder case. 32-year old Monnie Brabham was was shot by two suspects at the Murphy Oil Company on Watson Boulevard. Two men from Atlanta have been arrested, and two others currently in custody for other crimes are being investigated for their possible role in the shoot ing. The unidentified suspects now in custody are reportedly members on an Atlanta criminal gang.

Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00 and 8:30 for a total of six minutes.

July 15, 2014: The investigation into the December death of a Houston County infant has resulted in the arrest of the boy's father, who is charged with murder. 26-year old Charles Taylor told authorities he accidentally dropped the child onto a tile floor. GBI medical examiner James Whitaker ruled the death as a homicide. The findings were completed last week, leading to Taylor's arrest.

Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00 and 8:30 for a total of three minutes.

July 15, 2014: Ron Wildman reports today on Mix in the Morning that a fourth man sought in the late May triple murder on Fairburn Avenue has been caught. 30-year old Lewis Cheney II has been on the run since the shooting deaths of Arika Jarrell, Ralph Heard and Terrance Dent, Jr. There other men are being held in connectin with the robbery-shootout. Cheney was picked up at a Sheraton Drive motel following a Crimestoppers tip.

Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00, 8:30 for a total of four minutes

July 16, 2014: On Mix in the Morning today, Ron Wildman says the Bibb County sheriff's department is warning of a phone scam involving the impersonation of a Bibb officer. Sheriff David Davis reminds citizens that Bibb deputies or other Bibb Court officers never call the public asking for

money or payment of any kind. He warns the public never to provide any unsolicited caller with personal or financial information.

Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00 and 8:30 for a total of four minutes

July 17, 2014: Ron Wildman reports to day that the Southeastern Regional Task Force yielded an array of drugs while making an arrest at Macon Gardens Apartments. Three people were arrested and several thousand dollars worth of drugs and fire arms were confiscated. Wildman says the sheriff's department identified those arrested as 19-year old Re'Keeyah Mitchell, 26-year old Andre Samples and 25-year old Kenterrious Coker. Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00 and 8:30 for a total of four minutes

July 18, 2014: The Warner Robins police department has closed down eight more convenience stores in a continuing fight against illegal gambling. The stores allegedly pay off winners with cash. Payouts of merchandise or gasoline products those who play video gambling games are legal, but not cash. Raids earlier this year involved several other stores guilty of the same illegal operations. Most stores, after a probationary period or an appeal, are allowed to re-open. Some of the offenders are repeaters.

Story aired at 6:00, 6:30, 7:00, 7:30, 8:00 and 8:30 for a total of four minutes

July 21, 2014: Crimes committed by crimefighters is a sore subject with local officials. U.S. attorney Michael Moore will set trial dates soon for three of four Bibb County deputies charged with corruption. One of the four has entered a guilty plea and is cooperating with investigators and prosecutors to implicate the other three. All three have said they are not guilty.
